





THE CAMPS IN 2020

In working closely with the six camps for Christian Scientists, we witnessed the devotion of prayerful thought each camp was giving as they worked through the best way for their camp to go forward with summer plans in line with CDC and American Camp Association recommendations in their respective states. How grateful we were to see the lovely unfolding of God's plan for each camp.

At the same time, TCF continually asked "What can we do to bless more?". This led to funding adults as well as children; to extend funding to all camp programs including day camp and online camp, as well as family camp and adult-centered programs; and to extend funding throughout the U.S. and Canada.

Leelanau/Kohahna

They found they could offer two one-week sessions of Day Camp before they could open for regular camp sessions.

Outreach Program

Network of TCF Representatives Expands

These individuals comprising our network of volunteers recently expanded to include states nation-wide and provinces throughout Canada. Each of them are truly camp-passionate! Many attended camp, others sent their kids and grandkids to camp, and some donate to camp. Several have worked as camp nurses and practitioners or volunteered in the kitchen. Each of them recognizes the importance of their role in identifying and encouraging families to send their

children to camp. The broadening of TCF's scope to include adults for family camp and off-season programs allows them to speak with everyone at their branch church about the joys of going to camp.

TCF Holds Outreach Events

Aided with a new all-camp video featuring all six camps for Christian Scientists, we held in-person Outreach Events until early March when we switched over to online events. Families and church groups were able to see what each camp has to offer, learn about funding for camp, and ask questions.

The following are grassroots examples of finding and encouraging new campers to attend camp.

TCF Rep reaches out to family new to the U.S. and to Christian Science

A Congolese family escaped civil war to a refugee camp in Tanzania. While there, they learned about Christian Science. The U.S.

State Department relocated this family of six to Des Moines, Iowa, provided them an apartment, and food stamps. The family found a local church, the same church as our Iowa TCF Representative, who said, "We can imagine what it must feel like to be "a stranger in a strange land" (Exodus 2:22). The church

membership embraced this family, giving them rides to church, teaching the kids in Sunday School, and helping them apply for camp. Our lowa Rep filled out TCF applications with them and funding was approved. His sister drove them to and from camp, where the whole family spent five weeks. Both parents are now class taught.

Reaching out to a child earning funds for camp

Learning to overcome the belief in lack is a life lesson. Rather than just accepting that his family could not afford the seven-week camp tuition, one young middle-school camper created his own fundraiser. "What hast thou in the house?" (II Kings 4:2) was his motivation for a creative solution. The camper contacted local families to sell dinners. The only meal on the menu was his

family's traditional favorite, a Cameroon dish "Beans & Donuts". A meal at \$35 would feed a family of four. In one weekend, he shopped for ingredients, cooked all night, prepared the meals, and earned \$605. His parents doubled this amount. TCF learned about this child's efforts to earn funding so he could attend camp and enthusiastically funded the balance.





In the fall of 2020, we started a Camp-Passionate Campaign to share how we REALLY feel about the CS camps. We passionately LOVE each one of these precious camps. Our campaign was formed to engage others who feel the same way to spread their enthusiasm and love for each of our CS camps, and to encourage individuals – both children and adults to attend camp.

There are four ways to express your camp-passion:

- Attend Camp! This is the most fun form of expressing camp-passion. It helps you know what our CS camps are all about.
- 2. Volunteer at camp
- 3. Share your story with others
- 4. Give so others can attend camp

CAMP-PASSION noun: Love for camp; demonstrated awareness, engagement, enthusiasm, and gratitude for camp.

CAMP PASSPORTS

As the number of camp programs we were able to support grew (family camp programs and programs for adults), so did our camp-passion. It was easy to see that with the wonderful variety of programs available, there was a program for anyone interested in attending camp.

To help encourage camp-passion for adults the Camp Passport was developed. It's geared toward the grown-up camper – to encourage participation in the various adult

and family programs at all six camps. These programs in the fall and winter, include a Christmas or Winter Camp, Bible Study, a Military Weekend, a Harvest Women's Weekends, Creative Arts Camp, etc. Each time you attend one of the camps, the camp will stamp your passport. What a great way


